Background of research program

The Japan-ASEAN Collaboration Research Program on Innovative Humanosphere in Southeast Asia has been established to build compatibility growth of global communities. This is a part of program for advancing strategic international networks to accelerate the circulation of the talented researchers proposed by the Japan Society for the promotion of science (JSPS).
