• Research background

The aim of this study is to trace the history of Pakistan's languages and the extent and development of publishing culture as it relates to Islamic thought in Pakistan. Islamic theologian and politician Maulana Saiyid Abu al-Ala Maududi (1903-1979) and his publications are the subject matter of this research. Maududi was a controversial twentieth-century Islamist thinker who worked in South Asia. He founded the religious party Jamaat-e Islami (Islamic Party) in 1941 in Lahore and wrote over 150 books and pamphlets in Urdu.

• Research purpose and aim

Based on the result of my previous fieldwork, I commenced my main research on Urdu publishing and Maududi at the Markfield Institute of Higher Education in Leicester, UK. This institute is an independent research group based on the Islamic Foundation, UK.

The Business School at Durham University held the Eighth International Workshop on Islamic Economics and Finance on 25 and 26 August 2014. I made a presentation on Maulana Maududi's economic writing, focusing on banking interests.

I was very impressed by the intense interest in this academic gathering.

While staying in Markfield, I often went to the mosque on campus. It is located near the entrance of the campus and is open to visitors 24 hours a day. July was the month of Ramadan in the Islamic calendar; it is the month of fasting. I attended evening gatherings to break the fasting and study meetings during the daytime. At the end of Ramadan, they had special events, festivals, and meetings on and around the campus. I enjoyed being with campus members, foundation members, volunteers, and locals.
